1. Please tell us why you would like to serve on the CBAA Executive Board?

I have lived in South Africa for the past five years and I am presently connected to Cornell Alumni in several African countries and I can help facilitate the establishment of the necessary connections to build a CBAA presence on the African continent.

4. Please tell us about your other Cornell volunteer activities?

I do not currently volunteer in other Cornell activities, but my family does make an annual contribution to the Cornell Alumni fund. While I was a student at Cornell I was avidly involved in Black Students United, African Students Association, National Organization of Minority Architects Student Chapter, Cornell Tradition and lived in the Wana Wake Wa Wari Cooperative. I volunteered a few summers for the Cornell Alumni weekend, Thakaneng African Centered Saturday School for children in Ithaca and served as a Resident advisor during a COSEP summer program.

My journey to working on the African continent was through the inspiration of Dr. James Turner while I was a student pursuing a minor concentration in Africana Studies. The African Studies research centre provided a compliment to my professional education that has continuously proved fruitful to my professional career as I currently work on development issues on the African continent. With that said I understand the significance of the Africana Studies & Research Centre and the importance that Cornell Black Alumni have made to support the creation of an enriching educational experience for myself and those after me by fighting for this institution. I only hope that through my involvement I can encourage other Black Alumni who have lost touch, with their alma mater and fellow graduates, to reignite those relationships and help to build a strong organization of Cornell Black Alumni. My plan is to return to the United States to continue to build my career and make a lasting contribution to CBAA.
